Meeting on a weekly basis, the society covers a wide range of events such as film and pizza nights, to guest lectures. This year the society has developed these guest lectures by booking two keynote speakers for the academic calendar. The first of these, occurring just a few weeks ago, was given by Dr. Tim Lockley from the University of Warwick. Dr. Lockley gave a lecture titled "'Supermen' The West India Regiments, and the Black Male Body: 1795-1802'. This was a huge success.

Whilst there are various events during the term for the society members to attend, the biggest event of the academic calendar for the society is the trip abroad in January. These trips offer members of the society the opportunity to explore the history of a different country and its culture for a week, and also to form friendships with society members across the year groups. This is something that committees across the years have actively encouraged, to create a more communal feel to the society. Previous trips abroad have been to Berlin and Vienna, and this academic year the society will be travelling to Budapest. Highlights of the trip will include a visit to Parliament, the Holocaust Memorial Museum, the Basilica and the National Museum.



How is your course going?
