The School is home to recognised experts on African, American, British and Irish, European (including French,

German and Russian), Islamic and imperial history, with particular strengths in the history of medicine, military history, Medieval and Early Modern cultural,

ecclesiastical, political and legal history.

We organise our research so that each of our academics has space to pursue their own projects, and we pride ourselves on the rigorous quality of our research outputs.

Our research interests are currently focused on

four key areas:

- history of commerce, global (America, Africa and Imperial) and cultural history
- history of medicine, ethics, environment and medical humanities
- history of Medieval and Early Modern cultures
- history of war, media, and society.



We are committed to using our study of history to make a difference to society today, and we always seek to build new research projects and incline existing ones towards the needs and interests of public audiences, practitioners, businesses, charities and heritage organisations.

We share our expertise with different audiences, working with radio and television, schools, historical associations, museums, private organisations and public bodies to explain the past and put the present in clearer context. MEET OUR ACADEMICS

Professor Julie Anderson completed her undergraduate studies in Australia and then moved to the University of Leicester where she finished her PhD in 2001. In that year, she was appointed to a Research Fellowship at the University of Manchester where she worked until 2009, when she was appointed Senior Lecturer in the History of Modern Medicine at the University of Kent

Research interests

Julie's research interests cover the history of medicine in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. She is particularly interested in the cultural and social history of physical disabilities and blindness, and is currently completing a monograph on a medical history of blindness 1900-1950.








Professor Mark Connelly studied for his undergraduate and PhD degrees at Queen Mary, University of London. He was then a British Academy Postdoctoral Research Fellow at Lancaster University before coming to Kent in September 1999.

Research interests

Mark Connelly has broad interests in modern military history with a particular specialism in the commemoration of the First World War in Britain and the Commonwealth. He collaborates very closely with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, the In Flanders Fields and Passchendaele Memorial museums in Belgium and has been involved in a broad range of outreach and public engagement activity. Throughout the First World War centenary he worked with the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport assisting with the planning and delivery of the events commemorating the Battles of the Somme (2016) and Third Ypres (2017), the creation of range of travelling exhibitions, talks, lectures, study workshops and projects carried out in collaboration with a wide-range of history groups and societies. He can provide many different types of support including expert historical analysis, the identification of key archival sources and materials, and advice on how to stage living history events suggesting and shaping content, materials, and high-quality outreach activities.

Dr Ben Marsh grew up in Oxfordshire, completed his undergraduate and postgraduate degrees at the University of Cambridge (Downing College), and subsequently taught at Brunel University (2001-2), the University of Oxford, where he was a Lecturer in Colonial & Revolutionary American History (2002-4), and the University of Stirling in Scotland (2004-14). He joined the School of History at Kent in September 2014.





Research interests

Ben's main research interests are in the social and economic history of the Atlantic world c.1500-1820 and the settlement of early America, including gender and race history, the US South and slave societies, demography, the American Revolution, and, latterly, textile history.



Professor Barbara Bombi studied at the Catholic University in Milan, where she completed her PhD in 2000. In 2001 she was a research fellow at the German Historical Institute in Rome. Between 2002 and 2004 she had a post-doctoral fellowship at the University of Padua before moving to Oxford where she took up the post of Lyell Research Fellow in Latin Palaeography at Corpus Christi College. In 2006 she moved to Canterbury after being appointed as a Lecturer in the School of History at the University of Kent. She was appointed Professor of Medieval History in 2018.

Research interests

Barbara's research interests cover ecclesiastical and religious history in the High Middle Ages (1200-1450) and she specialises in the medieval papacy and canon law. Barbara has worked on the Crusades of the early 13th century, writing a monograph on mission and Crusade in the Baltic area during the pontificate of Pope Innocent III. Her research also includes the history of the Military Orders, especially the Teutonic Knights in the 14th century. In the past few years, Barbara has edited the register of the representative at the papal curia of Edward II and Edward III and has started to compile a catalogue of the manuscripts of the Liber Extra (Decretals of Gregory IX), which are preserved in the British Libraries. She has recently completed a monograph on Anglo-papal relations in the 14th century, published by OUP.
