



Why is copyright important?

"Copyright legislation exists to protect the right-owners' ability to benefit from the reproduction and dissemination of material that belongs to them".

Q1 Authors retain copyright of their publication with no restrictions. All publications must be published under an open license, preferably the Creative Commons Attribution Licence CC BY. In all cases, the license applied should fulfil the requirements defined by the Berlin Declaration:

= Moving from copyright assignment to licensing

What are the realities? Researchers:

Confused & Range of understanding and views unaware Erratic Copyright in the institution vs copyright in the wild Behaviour Copyright Prestige as key aim of publishing as currency

What are the realities? Publishers:

Complexity Sharing policies impenetrable of policies Secret Claim widest dissemination whilst restricting access enemy Reposition Protecting image as being aligned with academic goals themselves

What are the realities? Institutions:

Removing Simple workflows remove researcher engagement context Lack of Copyright lacking institutional priority resources Academic Researchers suspicious of institutional involvement Freedom

What can we do about it?

- Much more focus is needed on basic copyright literacy to help researchers make informed decisions about their publishing
- Frame benefits of rights retention as supporting "scholarly culture" rather than "copyright culture"
- Use copyright resourcing effectively

Benefits:

- A less obstructive community to work with to implement new policies
- They will know what they need to do when it's asked of them



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
