## STUDIES 1-3

Investigated perceptions of what feminists believe ( $N$ $=404, N=352, N=208$ )

Is feminism a zero-sum movement - i.e., will gains made by women result in losses for men?

Do feminists care about issues that affect men? e.g., educational underachievement, intimate partner violence (IPV) against men
Questions about own views accompanied by metaperceptions - i.e., how would a feminist answer?


## RESULTS

Participants had exaggerated stereotypes of feminists zero-sum perceptions

Scored lower on zero-sum perspectives than participants predicted; however, not lower than non-feminists

Participants underestimated feminists' warmth towards men (Figure 1)

Feminists liked men less than non-feminists, but still had positive feelings

Had strongly positive feelings towards women
Participants underestimated how much feminists cared about men's issues (e.g., masculine norms)

[^0]feminists on these issues


RESULTS
Caring about men's issues positively correlated with caring about women's issues, r(329) $=.40, p<.001$ (Figure 2)

Relationship is not zero-sum, but positive sum Figure 2: Importance of Men's and Women's Issues


Importance of Men's Issues
Feminism positively associated with caring about women's issues; not associated with men's issues

Participants underestimated how much feminists care about men's issues

STUDY 5
Investigated whether similar stereotype applies to other social movements ( $N=255$ )


Feminists, Black Lives Matter (BLM) activists, gay rights activists, trans rights activists

Are minority group activists assumed to dislike the majority group; not care about issues that affect them? Does this matter?


For caring matters, significant activism $\times$ group interaction, $F(2.78,791.41)=10.14, p<.001, \eta p^{2}=$ .039

Perceived to matter more if feminists cared about majority group than other activists (Figure 4)
Only group expected to care about majority group more than non-activists

Figure 4: Caring About Majority Matters


People think feminists don't like men; don't care about issues that affect men

Actually care about men as much as anyone else Feminists stand out for caring about women more
People think feminists should care about men
Not true for other minority group activists
Future research could examine why feminists are uniquely expected to care about men
