
About Us

About Us

- History sits in a larger School of Humanities (SOH), headed by Dr Sarah Dustagheer
- One of ten Schools that make up the University. We are home to the humanities at Kent

What Makes University Special?

- Universities were created in the 11th century
- They were designed to be communities of scholars and students, who came together to advance knowledge (their own as well as a wider society) through study and debate
- Universities are among the oldest human institutions in the world
- Older than the nation-state, they exist as spaces in which people can come together to learn, to discuss, to debate and to question the most basic things that underpin the world we live in...



What Makes University Special?

To function, universities rely, then as now, on everyone who makes up a university taking up the challenge of living by a few key rules:

- **Confront your assumptions**
- **Challenge yourself to dig deeper**
- **Examine the evidence**
- **Test your ideas**
- **Never be afraid of debate**
- **Keep an open mind**

- Think critically
- Learn to question
- Build arguments with evidence
- Challenge
- Communicate
- Look behind the event to the structure

Your Course (Day to Day)



At university level, two hours of preparation (reading, note taking, planning) are required for every hour of lecture or seminar time
