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
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WHY TO STUDY LATIN

WHY TO STUDY LATIN

- 80% of English comes from Latin and Greek.
- 10% of all Latin has gone directly into English: video, quorum, agenda, exit, bonus, et cetera.



WHY TO STUDY LATIN

For **EXAMPLE**, every time you go to the **DOCTOR**, if you need a **MEDICINE**, or you want to be **FLEXIBLE** and **CIVIL** when you go to the **AQUARIUM** to see the **INCREDIBLE SPECIES** of **DIFFERENT ANIMALS** you need to **STUDY** for **BIOLOGY**.



WHY TO STUDY LATIN

2) It is actually used every day in:

- Scientific terms (*dentist, nucleus, calories, malnutrition...*)
- Legal terms (*habeas corpus, prosecutor, bona fide...*)
- Common phrases (*carpe diem, cogito ergo sum...*)
- Abbreviations (e.g. *exempli gratia, PS post scriptum, AD anno domini...*)
- Literature (*Severus, expelliarmus, petrificus totalis...*)



WHY TO STUDY LATIN

3) Value added to your degree:

- Understand sources for yourself: graffiti, letters, coins, poetry, laws, tombstones
- Learning about the Roman culture, literature, art, way of thinking and more

LATIN LANGUAGE: VERBS

■ I	<i>amo:</i>	I love	<i>scio:</i>	I know
■ You (“thou”)	<i>amas:</i>	you love	<i>scis:</i>	you know
■ He/she/it	<i>amat:</i>	he loves	<i>scit:</i>	he knows
■ We	<i>amamus:</i>	we love	<i>scimus:</i>	we know
■ You (y'all)	<i>amatis:</i>	you love	<i>scitis:</i>	you know
■ They	<i>amant:</i>	they love	<i>sciunt:</i>	they know



LATIN LANGUAGE: NOUNS

- Nominative (doer): *servus* = slave *filia* = daughter
- Accusative (done to): *servum* *filiam*
- Genitive (of x): *servi* *filiae*

amo = I love

scio = I know
