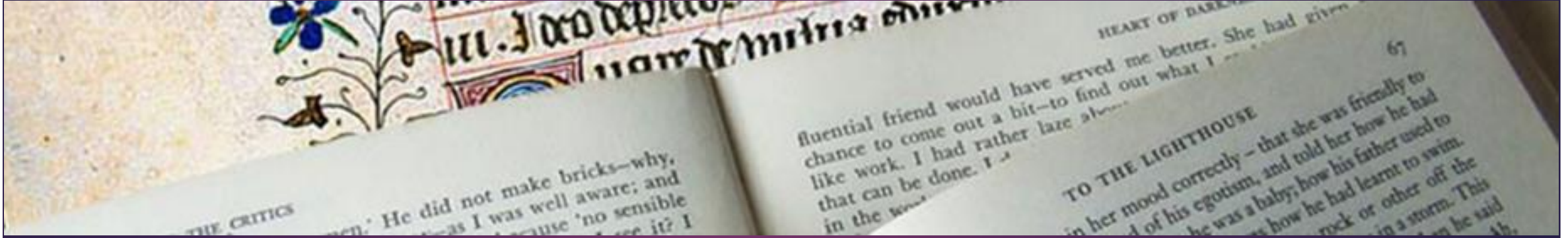

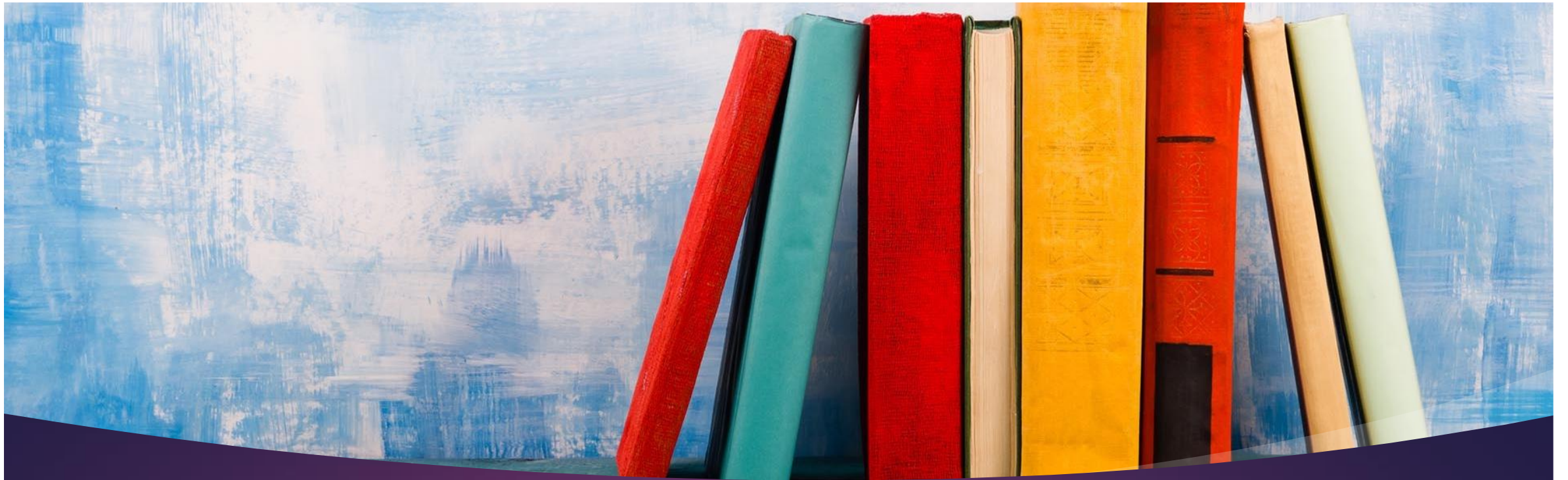
MA Degree Structure

MA = 180 credits across two stages:

- ▶ Stage 1 = 6 x 20 credit modules (FT – 2 x Autumn, 2 x Spring; 2 x Summer; PT – 1 x Autumn, 1 x Spring, 1 x Summer across 2 years)
- ▶ Stage 2 = Dissertation (FT – summer plus term & vacation; PT – summer plus term & vacation in Yr 2)

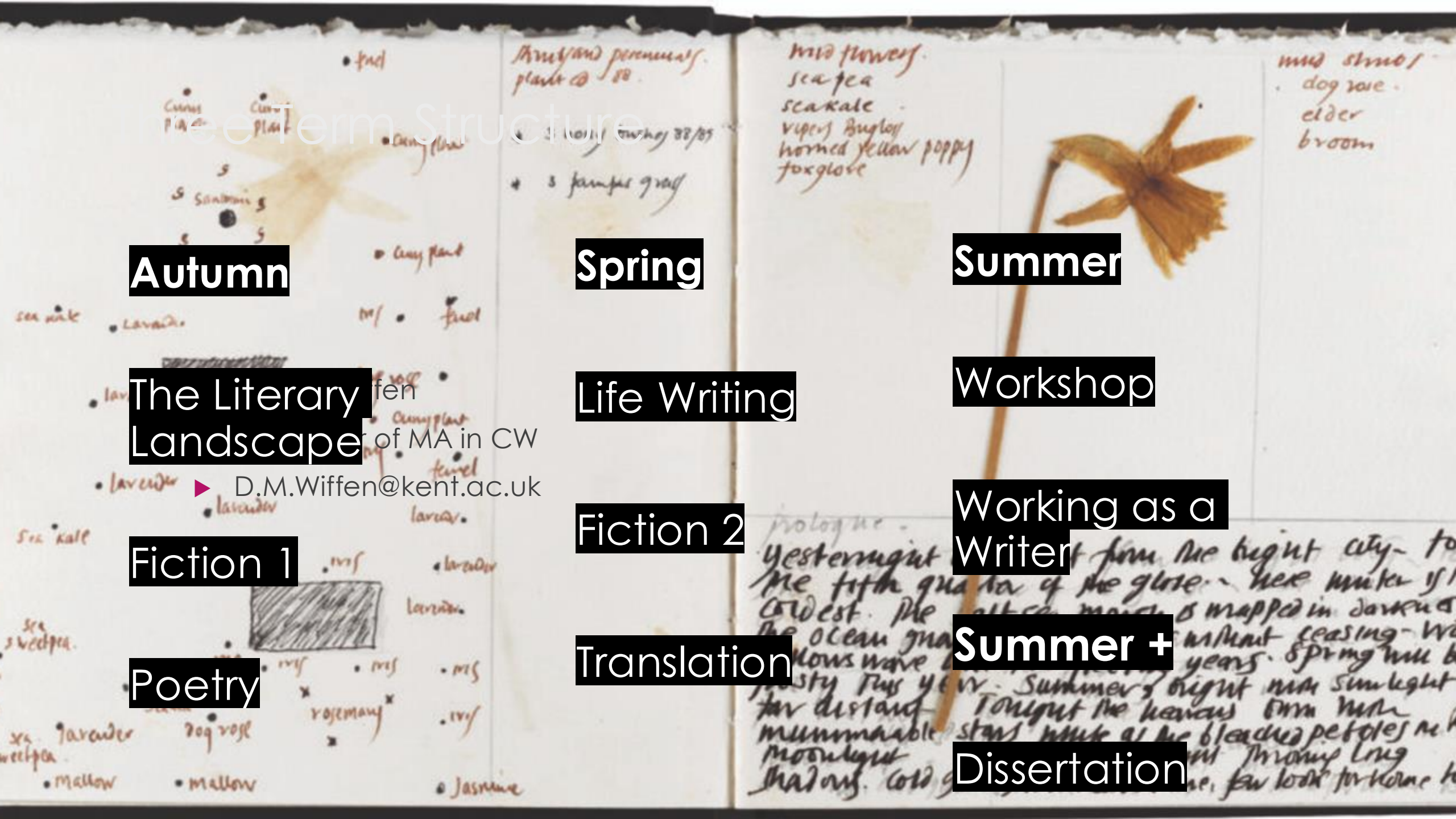
