

Attendance and Engagement

It is important that you fully engage with your studies and attend all teaching activity from the start. We check your in-person attendance every couple of weeks across each teaching term. If we see a pattern of low attendance or other engagement, we will check-in to see how we can help.

If you are contacted about your attendance, please:

1. Start attending (and continue to engage on Moodle, etc).
2. Log your attendance on **Presto** or self-report if you need to be absent.
3. Speak to your Academic Adviser or the Engagement Support team.



Unfortunately, if you are not attending in-person teaching then it may get to the point where you will not be able to continue your studies (but we want to help before it gets to that point).

Late Submission Policy

If you miss a deadline and need a bit more time ...

**up to 24 hours late
max mark is 60**

Where the assignment is submitted **within 24 hours** of the published deadline, the mark recorded for the piece of work may not exceed the mark of 60;


**up to 48 hours late
max mark is pass**

Where the work is submitted **within 48 hours** of the published deadline, the mark to be recorded for the piece of work will be capped at the pass mark for the module;

**more than 48 hours
mark is zero**

Where work is **more than 48 hours** after the published deadline a mark of zero will be recorded.

OR you can request an extension to the deadline without any mark penalty if they have extenuating circumstances that are eligible for mitigation.

Purpose of the workshops


1. To **demystify** your assignments

What *Write Right!* will teach you


- To take pride in what you are submitting

- We provide **free impartial, independent and confidential** advice and guidance to students.
 - **Academic** – appeals, extenuating circumstances, academic misconduct
 - **Housing** – support with contracts, landlords, finding replacement tenants
 - **International Students and Visas** – documentation, working hours, legal requirements
 - **Finances** – queries around tuition fees, loans, grants, budgeting advice, payment plans.
- **Campus Pantry** – for those experiencing food insecurity students can have access to food, toiletries and hygiene products.
- **Mandela Student Centre 10am-4pm** (e-mail, telephone and drop in available).

Meet the **Careers and** **Employability** **Service**

THE GOOD NEWS!

- In 2024, the employment rate for working-age graduates was 87.6%
- In 2024, 67.9% of working-age graduates were in high-skilled employment compared to 23.7% of non-graduates.
- In 2024, the median real term salary for graduates was £26,500. This was £7,000 more than working-age non-graduates. (Please note, salaries are calculated using earnings from individuals' full-time main jobs only.)
- Your degree will give you more employment opportunities and a better wage

THE CHALLENGES

- In the 2025 cycle there were 439,180 applicants accepted for UK degree places through UCAS as of 14th August 2025. This represents a 3.1% increase from the 425,860 accepted applicants in 2024.
- Growth in the number of university graduates signifies more competition for graduate job opportunities. Employers then become more selective and pose a more challenging set of job requirements.

Your degree gives you access to the graduate labour market, however:

Employers look for evidence of motivation, generic and practical skills in recruitment decisions instead of examining only graduates' technical expertise and academic results.

How can the Careers and Employability Service help you?

Through the extensive range of appointments, resources, workshops, talks, events and resources you can benefit from using the Careers and Employability Service in many ways such as:

- Make informed choices – understand options with your degree, the graduate labour market (graduate schemes and graduate jobs), internships, year in industry and what opportunities that are out there that relate to your interests and motivations.
- Clear the fog – if you are uncertain about what you would like to do or the pathway to your career / job of choice
- Learn how to write strong CV's / cover letters / applications that are targeted and tailored to the roles you are applying
- Develop your employability for example – commercial awareness or understanding how engaging in activities from part time work, volunteering, extra curricular activities can help you stand out
- Discover how to prepare for interviews, the different types of questions you may be asked and how you can formulate your answers
- Be signposted to resources where you can view internships, placement year and graduate opportunities


