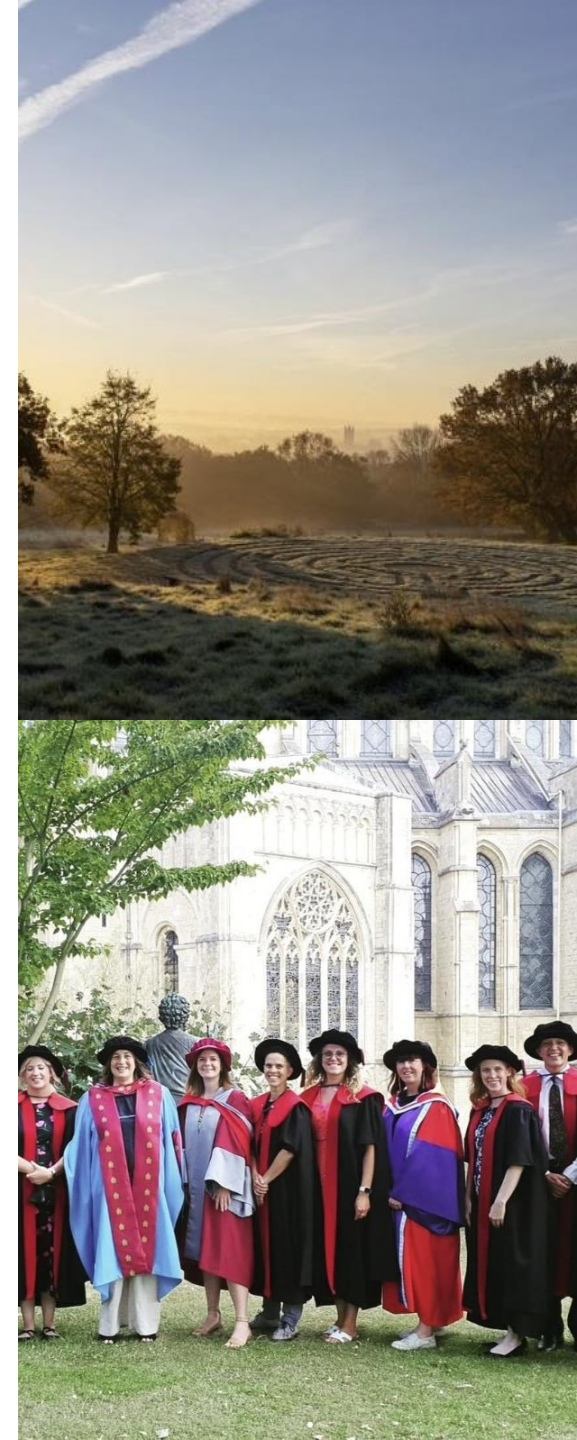

STUDYING CRIMINOLOGY

- **Politics** - government and opposition parties
- **History** - changing rates/reasons for crime over time
- **Sociology** - social criminogenic factors
- **Psychology** - psychological criminogenic factors
- **Medico-legal science** – forensic investigation
- **Policy studies** - changing crime policies
- **Law/legal theory** - legal definitions of crime

OUR CRIMINOLOGY DEGREE PROGRAMMES

- **Criminology and Criminal Justice** - Core modules in *Criminology and Criminal Justice*
- **Criminology and Sociology** - Core modules in *both subjects*

TEACHING FORMATS

4 HOURS CONTACT PER COURSE

*2 COURSES PER TERM OVER 3*10 WEEKS*

LECTURES

- A variety of options depending the course but usually 1 or 2 hours
- Centred on one topic from a module
- Delivered by a member of our team
- Everyone on the module in attendance
- The most “passive” part of your learning... but it should be very active!

SEMINARS

- Again, more variety but usually one hour
- Centred on one topic from a module
- Lead by a member of our team, but driven by you
- Smaller groups within a module
- Activities, debates, discussions - about deepening your understanding

WORKSHOPS

- Can vary in length – often 1 hour 50 mins long
- Lead by a member of our team
- Everyone on a module is in attendance
- Generally, a combination of lecture and seminar-style learning
- Mixture of more active and “passive” sections

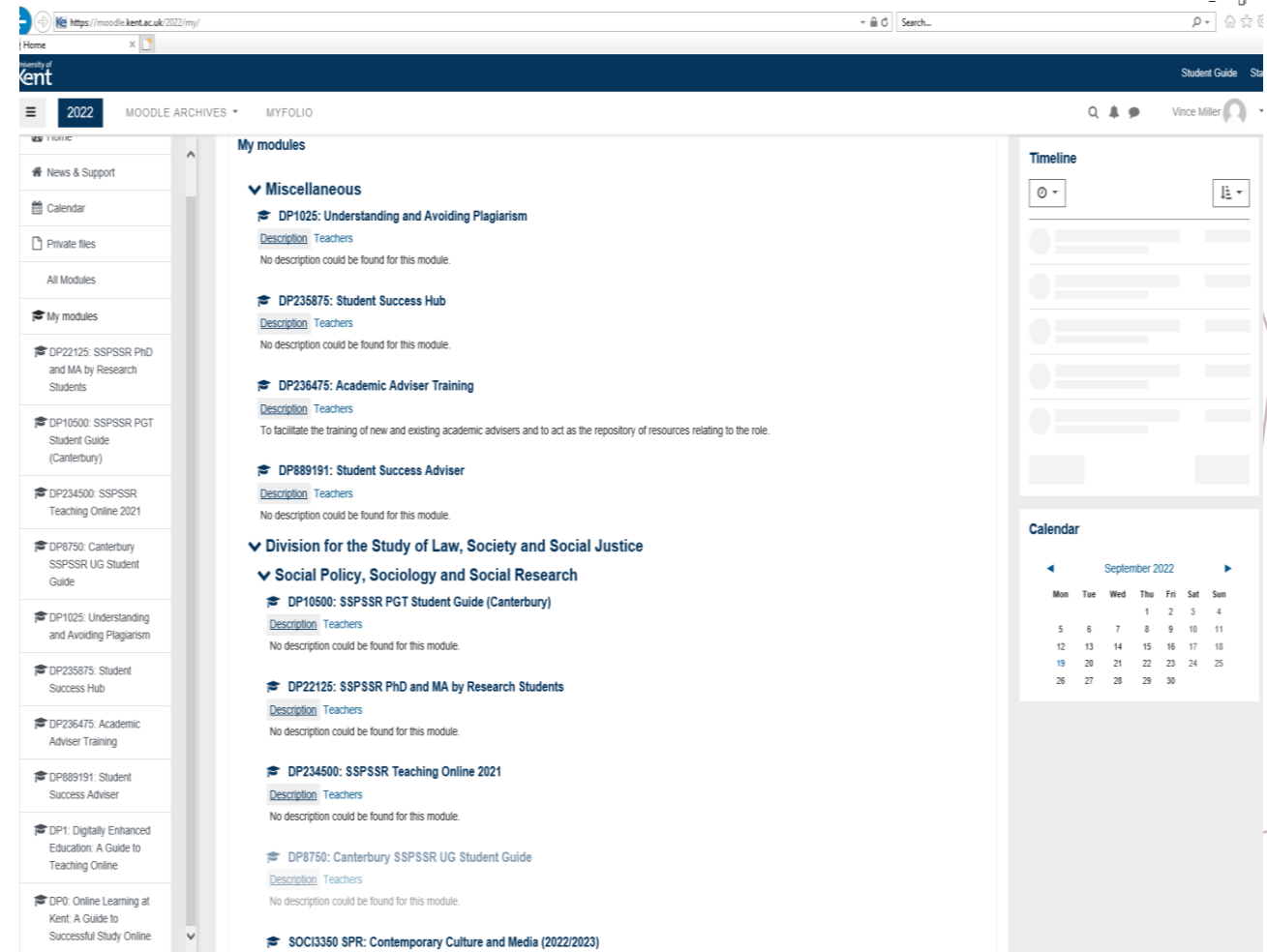


PERSONAL STUDY

- Doing additional reading:
 - Other suggested reading via Moodle
 - Broadsheet newspapers and magazines - *The Guardian*, *The Economist*, *New Statesman*
 - Online sources of academic publishing – e.g. *The Conversation*
- Meeting with classmates to discuss a reading, lecture or seminar, or to prepare for these.

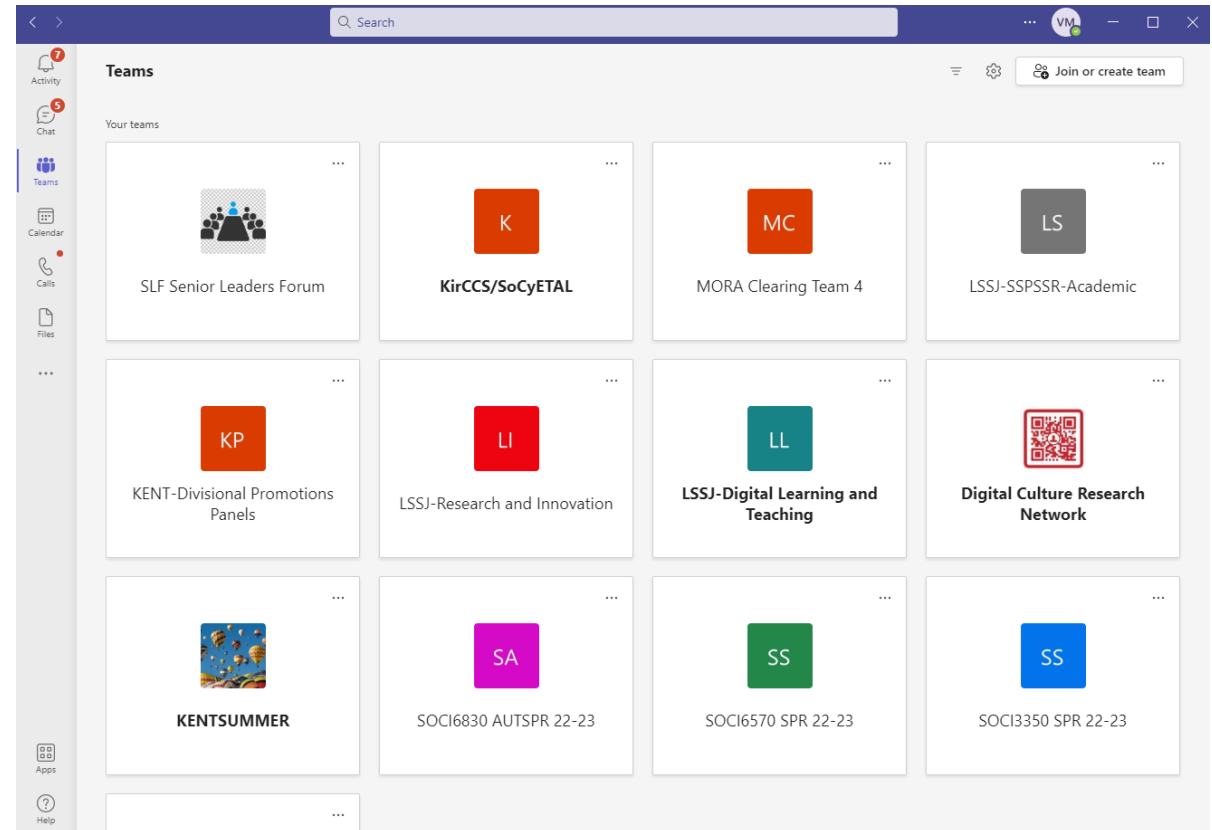
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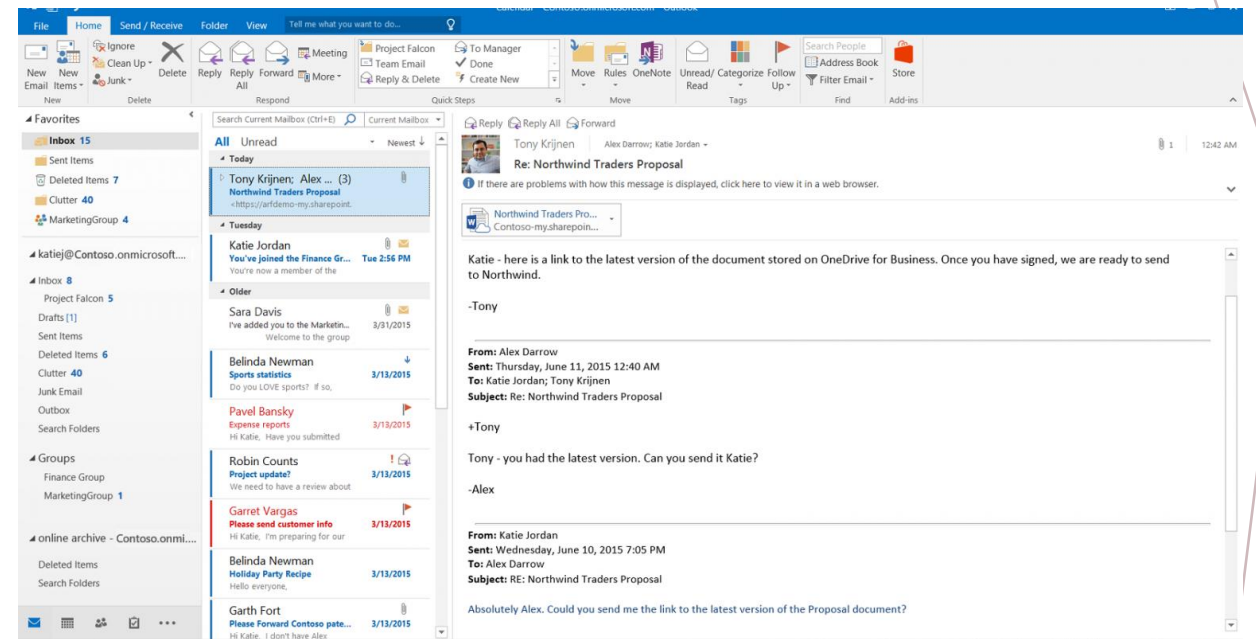

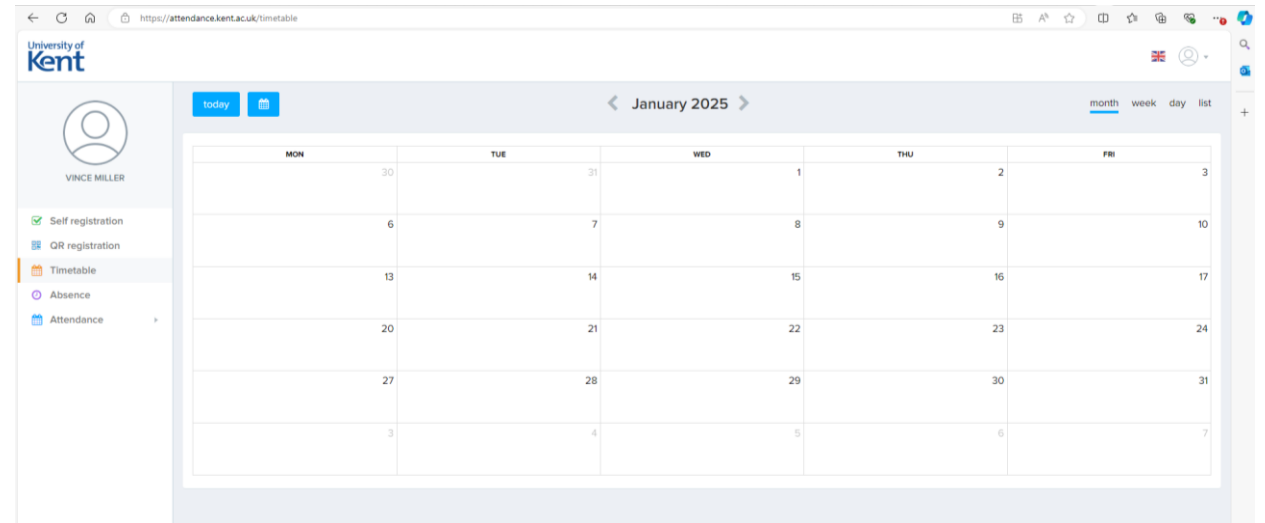

ASSESSMENTS

These vary from module to module – each has its own pattern, so pay attention to Moodle and in the first week of term

Assessments we use include:

- Seminar Participation
- Coursework
 - Essays
 - Poster Presentations
 - Reflective Writing
- Tests (e.g. Multiple Choice Questions)
- Written Exams

Always within the term in which the course happens

A 'small one' before 6th week

The main one due in the 10th week

- Day of week may vary



ACADEMIC 'CRIME': PLAGIARISM!

Academic integrity is very, very important. *Plagiarism* is essentially passing off someone else's work as your own in your essay.

*****Plagiarism is classed as cheating and is taken very seriously at University level*****

To avoid plagiarising in your work, *make sure* that you:

- Cite all sources, including sources on the internet;
- Cite all sources accurately and fully;
 - So that someone else could fine them!
- Avoid paraphrasing large sections of texts;
 - You're welcome to quote people though
