

2020 GCDC Student-led PhD Scholarships GCRF Compliance Statement Checklist

GCDC PhD scholarships are funded by the University of Kent's Global Challenges Research Fund (GCRF) allocation from the UK Government. To be eligible, the envisaged PhD project has to be ODA compliant. This means that the research must directly and primarily benefit the economic and social problems faced by developing countries on the <u>OECD's DAC list</u>.

GCDC student-led PhD applicants are asked to demonstrate how their envisaged research project is ODA compliant by providing a 500-word GCRF Compliance Statement as a part of their scholarship application form. Use the following checklist when writing your GCRF compliance statement:

☐ GCRF challenge areas (200 words maximum)

GCDC research projects need to fit within the <u>wider aims and specified challenges of the Global</u>
<u>Challenges Research Fund (GCRF)</u>, and applicants are asked to indicate the broad challenge area and the sub-challenge area that their envisaged research project supports. The GCRF aims are, inter alia, to promote challenge-led disciplinary and interdisciplinary research and to strengthen capacity for research, innovation and knowledge exchange in the UK and developing countries.

The GCRF challenge areas and sub-challenge areas are:

- 1. Equitable access to sustainable development
 - a. Secure and resilient food systems supported by sustainable marine resources and agriculture
 - b. Sustainable health and wellbeing
 - c. Inclusive and equitable quality education
 - d. Clean air, water and sanitation
 - e. Affordable, reliable, sustainable energy
- 2. Sustainable economics and societies
 - a. Sustainable livelihoods supported by strong foundations for inclusive economic growth and innovation
 - b. Resilience and action on short-term environmental shocks and long-term environmental change
 - c. Sustainable cities and communities
- 3. Human rights, good governance and social justice

- a. Understand and respond effectively to forced displacement and multiple refugee crises
- b. Reduce conflict and promote peace, justice and humanitarian action
- c. Reduce poverty and inequality, including gender inequalities
